Neighborhood Notes & Notables

Daniel Thompson, whose automatic bagel machine brought bagels to the masses—as well as a crushing blow to artisanal bagel makers—died on September 3 in Rancho Mirage, Calif. He died at the age of 94 earlier this month. Prior to the early 1960's, bagel making had long been a skilled and unionized trade, a highly-guarded craft that was passed from generation to generation. But Thompson—a mathematician born to a Jewish bagel baker—sought to invent a machine that would remove the time-consuming process of making bagels, which included forming and rolling the dough. With the help of his invention, bagel making quickly shifted from a skilled trade to bagel production on a large scale—which, in turn—helped introduce bagels to the American diet.

Whereas a traditional baker could make roughly 120 bagels in an hour, the automatic machines could turn out 400 with only an unskilled worker at the helm. They were quickly made—and with the help of Lender's who began using Thompson's machine to make bagels on a massive scale—were easily packaged, frozen and shipped to supermarkets across the country.

Will this be the time that the Novogratz clan actually has some luck with it? If history is anything to go by, probably not; but there was interest while the home was briefly on the rental market

(Heidi Klum was one of the renters), so who knows? *from Curbed*
